# energy / productivity

Leading to long-term cost savings for businesses by preventing higher electric bills.

Conduct an **energy audit** each year to measure improvements.

If you are an OG&E customer, use **Energy Insights**, a free tool that helps you track and manage electricity usage.

Install energy-efficient windows and use of window treatments to increase energy efficiency. (Blinds, shades, drapes, etc.)



Add reminders in shared spaces to unplug equipment when not in use. (coffee makers, desktop printers, radios, etc.)

Explore policies and incentives that could help fund these improvements. **Click here.** 

Set hours of operations for running building systems. (ie. HVAC system automated shutoff times)

Enroll in clean energy usage from OG&E or other utility company. If you are an OG&E customer, **click here to learn more.** 

Switch to energy-reducing and efficient lighting options, like LEDs.



Add a sticker or tape a reminder next to light switches asking staff to "turn off the switch" so lights are off when rooms are not in use.

When needing to replace appliances, select ones that are EPA ENERGY STAR certified. Click here to learn more.

If possible, install solar panels.

# water () conservation

Monitor water usage and set goals to reduce use.



If you have an irrigation system, only water in non-peak hours (early morning and evenings).

Or, reduce or stop irrigation altogether. Consider xeriscaping!

Find a water meter leak? Report it to okcutilities.com. If you see a major leak anywhere in the city, it should be reported to the City of OKC's emergency line at 405.297.3334.

Install control valves in faucet or low-flow aerators.



Collect rainwater for small-scale outdoor watering needs. For information about purchasing a rain barrel, contact OKC Stormwater at 405-297-1797.

Regularly check for and repair any leaks on faucets, toilets, and water heaters.

Switch to high efficiency water-use models of toilets.

Protect stormwater and lessen use of water by switching to drought-tolerant, native plants in any landscaping. Visit <u>OSU</u>

Extension's Resources page to learn about native and drought-tolerant plants.



Incorporate water, chemical, and energyefficient requirements or performance standards into landscape, irrigation service, and maintenance agreements.

Use compost to save water and feed plants - avoid using fertilizer altogether!

# waste m reduction

Have readily-available recycling options for employees and visitors. Provide individual recycling bins for each employee.



Include signage and regularly share information about what can be recycled to reduce contamination.

Prioritize purchasing goods made from recycled materials.

Add a composting option for staff. A vermicompost bin is an effective option for a smaller amount of waste, or you can explore a commercial composting service like Fertile Ground.

Evaluate where packaging can be reduced or eliminated. If you operate a retail location, consider eliminating use of bags except on request, or offering discounts for customers that bring their own.



Operate a restaurant or coffee shop? Switch to compostable items for to-go orders and only provide items like straws, bags, lids, etc. on request. Provide discounts to customers who bring their own to-go beverage containers. Commercial recycling contractors in Oklahoma City include Fertile Ground, Waste Management, Waste Connections, and Republic. See which one meets your recycling needs.

Set default printer settings to print double-sided to reduce paper use.

Evaluate what is currently being printed (brochures, info packets, etc.) that could be digital instead.

Switch to reusable or compostable options for cutlery, dishes, etc.



On a monthly, quarterly, or annual basis, conduct a waste audit. See how many bags of trash are being tossed, how much is being recycled, etc. Set goals with staff to reduce the amount of waste.

Eliminate bottled water by providing glasses or reusable bottles and adding faucet filters or fountain refill stations.

### clean air

Air pollution can cause difficulties for community health and contribute to climate change. These are recommendations for actions that can be taken on a local level.

Provide options for teleconferencing to avoid driving to meetings and allow options for telework. Every commute avoided helps air quality! Encourage public transportation or employee carpool options.



Install bike racks at the office, and ensure adequate facilities for bike commuters.

If you have workplace vehicles, share information with employees about reducing idling and engine run-time.

Measure, monitor, and manage fuel use and set targets to reduce each year.
